Life is Bitter Sweet

The need for our services continues to grow as available funding continues to be scarce. We routinely close our waiting list; currently we are trying to reach individuals who applied with us in March of this year. Last year we housed 40 men while we turned away 568 others.

According to the Baltimore City 2009 Homeless Census, on January 22, 2009, the City of Baltimore yielded a count of 3,419 homeless individuals, a 12% increase from the 2007 Census. The majority of these individuals were single, African-American, and male; 47% were between the ages of 45 and 60 years old. A significant 31% of the sheltered population were chronically homeless with substance abuse and mental health issues. To be classified chronically homeless an individual is unaccompanied with a disabling condition who has either been continuously homeless for a year or more, or has had at least four episodes of homelessness in the past three years. The main reasons for homelessness are health conditions such as mental illness and substance abuse (35%), income/employment problems (26%), and housing concerns (26%). Statistics such as these can be very disheartening, but the good news is that thanks to our caring friends and supporters we are able to continue to provide new beginnings through housing and each year many of the men gain stability and move to self-sufficiency.

In June a group of ministerial students from Germany came to Earl's Place as part of their visit to the United Church of Christ Central Atlantic Conference. The ten vicars, students who have completed their academic studies at university and are now engaged in full-time practical experience in parish ministry, spent time with us discussing the problems of poverty and homelessness which of course are universal.

VOICES OF THE VISIONARIES

CRIME IN THE COMMUNITY

At one time, my community seemed very peaceful and quiet. In the evening all of the adults usually sat outside at night with a cool drink and the company of the neighbors. Now when I go out to Cherry Hill I look at what my participation in the drug trade has done to my home.

I was a drug user who played a major role in keeping my community ridden with crime. Every time I bought drugs I kept the guns and violence in my community. At times the violence got so bad that people had to stay in their homes during the night and sometimes during the day as well. At the time I could not see anything wrong with what I was doing.

The days of sitting outside are gone because of the shootings and killings. It pains me to know that I played a part in someone's death. During my active addiction it did not bother me to learn of someone getting killed, to me it was all a part of the game of the drug trade. Now I am clean and sober and I see life out of new eyes.

I am trying to live a responsible life for myself, my family, my home and community. I know now that I played a big part in bringing down my home, my relationships, and my community. Each time I bought a bag of dope I helped to keep gang bangers in my community. Each time I said nothing, each time I did nothing, I became a part of the problem in my community.

I know now that my life, my community, my home and my family are all connected. Their strengths and weaknesses depend upon the actions, willingness, strengths and wisdom of the people who live there. Life does not go backward. It does not tarry with yesterday, nor should I.

HUNGER & HOMELESSNESS

On any given night in Baltimore City, approximately 3,000 people are looking for shelter. In Maryland 67% of the clients who utilized a food pantry have incomes below the federal poverty level of \$1,613 for a family of four. Fifty-eight percent of those households have a monthly income of less than \$1,000.

The week before Thanksgiving is National Hunger and Homeless Awareness Week (www.studentsagainsthunger.org) In keeping with this, the Chesapeake Association of the United Church of Christ has designated the Sunday before Thanksgiving Homeless Awareness Sunday.
